Friendship / Supporting Others Award Sponsored by Mellors

Alisha is a very hard working and conscientious young girl who finds many aspects of school challenging. Alisha is renowned in class for always trying her very best to help other pupils if she can, especially if she has understood a

concept or a problem. Alisha's kind nature is evident as she will always endeavour to help others within her peer group subconsciously. Alisha always offers to help her teachers and school staff in any way possible, often tidying up and sorting the classroom out without even being asked to! It is hard to explain all of the wonderful things that Alisha does throughout the day to support her friends as her care and kindness is engrained.

Henry - Year 6 Zetland Primary School

Henry has been an excellent friend to another pupil who has been in need of support this year. He has made sacrifices, both at school and at home. A situation arose due to his friend's dad being very poorly and Henry's family looked

after his friend whilst his dad was in hospital. This ensured that his friend has been able to continue to access school with the minimum of disruption. Henry has done this in an unselfish and caring manner and has not once asked for any kind of reward.

Jake - Year 3 Nunthorpe Primary Academy

Jake is a model citizen. He is always considerate, polite and caring towards his class pupils and around school. He does this naturally and without giving it a second thought. For example, he got caught in the rain coming to school one day.

Jake saw a younger pupil didn't have a coat on and took his own coat off and sheltered the other pupil with it, even though it meant he got soaking wet himself. He always holds the door for others and he demonstrates his impeccable manners in and around school. These apparent small tokens of kindness matter.

Jeremy - Year 3 Zetland Primary School

Jeremy has overcome many obstacles throughout the whole of this year showing true resilience and self-belief in all events he has attended. Jeremy has restricted mobility and often suffers with muscular pain, because of this he takes his wheelchair wherever we go. Jeremy has attended a Run For Fun event, plus the Gym festival, SEND Athletics, Net and Wall day and Hockey, gaining confidence along the way. Attending development days and competitions has given Jeremy the confidence to shine in P.E. sessions, demonstrating that if he puts his mind to it he can achieve whatever he wants to. Jeremy has changed so much this year, from a quiet, shy, reserved child into a child that holds his head up high and wants to achieve within any sport put his way.

River — Year 6 Riverdale Primary School

I believe that River deserves this award as despite suffering from hyper-mobility, that can cause her a lot of pain, she always gives 100% in all her sporting activities. She has never once used her condition as an excuse to not participate in P.E. or any other sporting activities. She is an excellent team player and frequently leads the warm-up sessions for the Year 6 P.E. lessons, (she is a hard task master). River embodies the type of student that every teacher would like in their class: determined and hardworking, with a never give up attitude.

Ollie —Year 4 Nunthorpe Primary Academy

Ollie is an enthusiastic golfer with a bright future ahead of him. At the age of nine, Ollie has won twenty tournaments, and has played competitively for the last eighteen months. In 2018, Ollie was entered into the British Championships. He was also invited to play in the 2019 European Championships. Ollie played against elite boys from fifty-seven different countries. In a recent Sports Week, Ollie spoke to his class about his passion for golf and his journey to date. He made reference to Tiger Woods and how resilience was an important element to being successful. Ollie's determination and sportsmanship shines and he deserves to succeed.

For the rest of that week, everywhere Hayden went he carried his litter picker, cleaning up after others.

Isabella —Year 2 Overfields Primary School

After this Maria comes into her own with the builders or representatives that come to give quotes. It is clear to see how Oliver's love of life brings out the positivity in others; he is an incredible role model and the other children really look up to him. Along with his sporting representations and achievements, Oliver's attitude towards his work has progressed incredibly this year; his belief in his own ability has opened doors to super academic progress and I know the future is extremely bright! Oliver is an inspiration to both children and staff alike and a true superstar. He never lets his condition affect his determination to achieve whatever he wants to achieve.

Jamie — KS2 LU Overfields Primary School

Jamie is a lively member of the KS2 Speech & Language
Unit at Overfields Primary School. During a recent national
school competition from Authors For Oceans, Jamie had to
help design a sea creature made out of plastic. In doing this he
had to verbally express his ideas to his peers and teachers. This
proved successful! The plastic starfish produced was short listed and Jamie had a
Skyped conversation with two authors. Speaking to unfamiliar people can be
frightening for any child, however for a child with speech and language difficulties
this is particularly challenging. Jamie excelled at this. He was confident with his
questioning, listened to answers and responded appropriately. He applied all of his
strategies to ensure he was understood, never losing faith in his own ability or his
confidence. His hard work was acknowledged later on social media by the two
authors, who stated how impressed they were by him and how hard he had tried.

Adam —Year 6 Zetland Primary School

Adam lives alone with his dad. Adam's dad over the last year has become ill. Adam has helped his dad around the house and looked after him as best as he could. On Friday 4th May, school received a phone call to say that Adam's dad was very poorly and was in intensive care. Adam showed great resilience, as for the next month he had to stay with a foster family and he was in Year 6 and had SATS looming. In spite of all the worry and anxiety he was experiencing, he arrived at school each day with a smile on his face. He still helped other children in school via his work in the School Council and also sat his SATs in a cool, calm manner and we hope his results will reflect just how well he's done. As a postscript, Adam is now back at home with dad (who is now much better) and still comes to school with that big smile on his face.

Olivia — Year 5 Normanby Primary School

Olivia came up to Year 5 working significantly below her age. She has since been diagnosed with a EHCP but this has not stopped her. Olivia tries her best within every lesson and every piece of work given to her. She has tried extremely hard to learn her spellings and apply these to her work. Although Olivia is aware she does not receive the same spellings or homework as everybody else, this has not stopped her or diminished her attitude to learning. Olivia loves to please. Within maths in particular, she has progressed greatly this year, overcoming barriers to learning she had previously at the beginning of the year.

Eileen —Reception Riverdale Primary School

Eileen's family are from Albania and she started Riverdale EYFS with very little English. She would cry throughout every session and didn't want to leave the familiar surroundings of the classroom. Eileen was timid around unfamiliar adults and found it difficult to make relationships. Now Eileen is a confident member of the class, she has come to school every day and faced her fears head on. Eileen has been able to self-regulate her emotions and even when upset can be found comforting others with the same or different challenges. She sets a fantastic example to other children in the class with her resilience and kind attitude.

Phoebe —Year 6 Overfields Primary School

Phoebe is a naturally kind and caring child. In class and around school she always puts the feelings of others before her own. On her 11th birthday, she demonstrated the most mature, selfless and generous behaviour which

moved adults and children alike. She didn't think about what she would like for a present, instead Phoebe set up a Facebook page which she shared with her friends. Instead of the presents Phoebe asked for donations of clothes, shoes and toiletries which she then donated to a homeless shelter, along with items she had bought herself. Phoebe has also raised £40 for Step Out for Stroke and has helped organise a sponsored trek personally raising £50 towards the total. Phoebe personifies generosity and kindness as well as having a completely modest

and reserved attitude to the good deeds she is part of.
